


EXAMINING FAMILY STRUCTURES OVER MULTIPLE GENERATIONS

Confidentiality: Your answers will be kept confidential. Any identifying information will not be shared, and the data will only be used for academic purposes. No one outside of this project will see your responses.



ETHICAL GUIDELINES FOR CONDUCTING THE RESEARCH

Confidentiality:

Ensure all responses are anonymous and stored securely. No personal identifying information should be included in the survey responses.

Informed Consent:

Before conducting the survey, make sure participants understand the purpose of the study, how their data will be used, and their right to withdraw at any time.

Voluntary Participation:

Participation is voluntary. Ensure participants understand they are not obliged to participate or complete the survey if they feel uncomfortable.

Sensitivity to Topics:

Be aware that family structures can be a sensitive topic for some participants, especially if they have experienced divorce, death, or conflict. Offer participants the option to skip questions if they feel uncomfortable.

Respecting Privacy:

Avoid collecting overly personal information. Stick to questions that are relevant to the study and avoid prying into family secrets or private matters.

Ethical Use of Data:


Use the data only for educational purposes and as part of the research project. Do not share data with anyone outside the study without explicit permission.








