

# Common family types in media

## Nuclear



A family unit consisting of two parents (traditionally male and female) and their dependent children living together in one household.


Contemporary definitions include cohabiting couples with children

## Same-sex



A family headed by a same-sex couple, who may have children through adoption, surrogacy, or previous heterosexual relationships.

## Reconstituted or blended



A family formed when two adults with children from previous relationships combine to create a new family unit.

## Lone or single parent




A family with only one parent raising one or more children due to separation, divorce, or the death of a partner.

## Lone person




Single person living on their own.

## Multi-Generational Household



A household where three or more generations of family members live together, such as grandparents, parents, and children, often for economic or cultural reasons.

## Family of choice/fictive kin




Non-biological families formed by people choosing their own family members, often seen in LGBTQ+ communities or among individuals who lack support from biological relatives.

## L.A.T.s (Living Apart Together)



Couples who are in a committed relationship but choose to live in separate households, often to maintain independence or due to practical reasons like work or family commitments.

## D.I.N.K.s



Couples who both work and choose not to have children, often prioritizing careers, financial stability, or lifestyle.
